## **Commemoration**

On June 17, 2015, Clementa C. Pinckney, Cynthia Marie Graham Hurd, Susie Jackson, Ethel Lee Lance, DePayne Middleton-Doctor, Tywanza Sanders, Daniel Lee Simmons, Sharonda Coleman-Singleton, and Myra Thompson were murdered by a self-professed white supremacist while they were gathered for Bible study and prayer at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church (often referred to as Mother Emanuel) in Charleston, South Carolina. Pastors Pinckney and Simmons were both graduates of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. A resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance for the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine was adopted by the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America on August 8, 2019. Congregations of the ELCA are encouraged reaffirm their commitment to repenting of the sins of racism and white supremacy which continue to plague this church, to venerate the martyrdom of the Emanuel Nine, and to mark this day of penitence with study and prayer.

# **Observing Juneteenth**

Excerpts from "Litany of Freedom: Juneteenth Colorful Family" Rev. Dr. Ralen M. Robinson, June 2023

Juneteenth is a celebration of liberation and freedom for All. So, on this day, June 19th, everyone comes together to stand hand in hand with one another and celebrate the abolishment of slavery.

This day celebrates and commemorates a time in our history when color defined a community. Where the content of someone's heart was colored by their hue. The year 1865 said no more to the imprisonment of our siblings in Christ, for it was a new era. I joyfully echo the words from the letter of Galatians and say, "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." For in God's kingdom, we are all a part of the beautiful tapestry of the church, which consists of various hues, shapes, sizes, and rough edges.

So, as you look at the stained-glass windows of your church Sunday morning, be reminded that it reflects your neighbor. A neighbor that doesn't look like you, act like you, vote like you, think like you, talk like you, or subscribe to the same God as you. Love, your neighbor, with no exceptions. Just as Jesus tells us repeatedly that we need to love one another as he does. Do not forget he intentionally sat on the margins to embrace the ones who were ostracized and felt unloved.

If we are called to pick up where Jesus left off and walk in his footsteps, how can we not celebrate the kaleidoscopes of colors within one another? I don't think it is a mistake that love is mentioned 714 times in the Bible because it is love that prevails and overcomes any hurdle or obstacle thrown our way.

Juneteenth is an opportunity to celebrate and continue to stand with one another and speak out for justice and equality. To bear the burdens of our neighbors when they cannot and proclaim the good news Christ bestowed upon us before he departed this world. A commandment that says in the Gospel of Saint John, "love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another." What a powerful and raw commandment. Everyone will know that you are my beloved faithful child, for we are part of a beautiful, diverse, colorful family that loves, cares, and cherishes one another.

"Liberty is meaningless where the right to utter one's thoughts and opinions has ceased to exist. That, of all rights, is the dread of tyrants. It is the right which they first of all strike down. 

### **Advocacy**

# **Steve's Science Tidbits**

### Dying of a Broken Heart

A popular theme in Shakespearian works is that of a character who dies from sheer heartbreak or severe emotional distress. Examples include King Lear, who dies shortly after daughter Cordelia's death; Lady Montegue in Romeo and Juliet after Romeo's banishment; King Henry's death in Henry IV is hastened due to extreme sadness; and Enobarbus in Antony and Cleopatra, whose guilt from deserting Antony leads him to proclaim, "I alone am the villain of the earth," and then wills his heart to break and soon dies.

Medical writings of the 1500's and 1600's spoke of the dangers of extreme emotions, warning they could overwhelm a person and even cause death. Overwhelming sadness was targeted as the most dangerous passion a person could experience. Thomas Elyot, one of the best-selling authors of his time, claimed that "there is nothing more enemy to life than sorrow." People were strongly urged to practice emotional moderation or even stoicism. A popular metaphor used at the time to describe the process of both growing old and grieving was of a lamp that gradually burned away its fuel.

Sadness is recognized today as one of the many pains of life that can negatively affect general wellbeing. But can it cause death? Cardiologist Peter Rahko at UW in Madison remembers a case from the 1980's. An elderly woman was summoned to a hospital in rural Wisconsin and asked to identify the body of her son who had died in a car accident. Within minutes of viewing her son, she started having severe chest pain and collapsed on the floor.

The woman was flown to Madison where Dr. Rahko inserted a catheter into her heart to determine if a blockage was causing a heart attack. To his great surprise, the arteries were totally clear, although heart function was severely reduced. In retrospect, he realized she had suffered from Takotsubo Syndrome.

When improvements in heart imaging technology were developed, doctors could directly study the hearts of patients who suffered serious heart symptoms after great emotional distress. In many such patients, they made a fascinating discovery: the left ventricle--the chamber that pumps oxygenated blood to the body—balloons out. The resulting shape reminded Japanese clinicians of a takotsubo, a round jar sea divers use to capture lobsters and octopuses, and in 1990 the term was chosen to describe the condition.

What triggers the ventricular swelling remains a mystery. One hypothesis is that an acute emotional event causes a surge of stress hormones such as norepinephrine in the brain and epinephrine in the adrenal glands. Because the left ventricle is rich in receptors for these hormones, it follows that exposure to a sudden flood could cause loosening of the muscular wall and subsequent ballooning, preventing adequate blood delivery to the body.

Takotsubo syndrome is rare, accounting for only 2% of patients seeking medical care. Nevertheless, now there is a physiological answer for historical deaths due to "grief" in patients with a seemingly normal heart.
