The Kuhagen family is hosting a teenage girl from Northern Ireland as part of the Ulster Project. Amy M. of St. Field in Northern Ireland (about 20 minutes from Belfast).

Welcome, Amy!

The Ulster Project began in the 1980s as the clashes between Protestants and Catholics in Northern Ireland occurred. The project finds youth 15 or 16 years of age to come and be paired with a host youth and families in various cities of the Unites States. Two adult counselors act as chaperones from the US city group and NI group. They have a project leader that oversees the four weeks together.

The youth do community service projects, fundraisers, attend a variety of church services, visit and learn about other cultures (Jewish, Muslim, Native American). They do "Discovery Days" for self reflection and growth in areas around personal values, beliefs, identity, problem solving, and conflict resolution, all from a Christian base.

They are "taught how to think not what to think/believe."

There are fun social times as well: Six Flags, pool parties, sailing, etc.

Each year, six American girls and six American boys ages 14-16 from Catholic and Protestant faiths who are matched with 12 Northern Irish teens of the same gender, age, and faith background.

The Ulster Project runs for four weeks from late June to late July.

There is no charge to participate in the Project. Host families cover the expenses of housing their Northern Irish teen and conducting family activities during the month. Throughout the year there are fundraising opportunities to help cover project costs.

Steve's Science Tidbits

Healing Broken Leg and Ankle Bones

Many of you have either suffered a fractured bone in a lower extremity or at least know someone who has. Healing is a long, drawn-out process, typically taking 6-12 weeks, but with full recovery requiring three-to-twelve months depending on the severity of the break.



Until recently, after the damaged area was encased in a plaster cast, the patient was to refrain from weight bearing activity lest it interfere with the healing process. The use of crutches was a prominent aid to help achieve this.

When a bone is broken, physicians are first concerned about stability of the fracture site—ie, how much will the bone fragments shift if you put weight on the leg. If too much, then the bone pieces are first realigned, and then surgery is usually performed, with the placement of screws, plates or rods. The healing process comprises three steps: (1) Inflammatory phase (1-2 weeks): The initial response is swelling and pain, as blood clots appear and blood cells rush to the site; (2) Reparative phase (2-8 weeks): A soft callus forms, filling the fracture gap, that slowly hardens into a hard callus that provides further support; and (3) Remodeling phase (6+ weeks): The bone gradually reshapes and strengthens itself, restoring the same classical bone structure of mature long bones.

Until recently, casts remained on the leg until the first two phases of repair were completed, assuring that, once removed, the now-solid bone would more easily and safely support weight-bearing. But such precaution comes with unfortunate consequences.

The longer the cast remains on the leg, combined with its immobilization, the more the leg suffers tissue wasting. Said one prominent orthopedic surgeon, "you come out of the cast with a sort of hairy, withered leg that takes forever to overcome." This is because loss of muscle and bone mass occurs much quicker than one's ability to gain it back. The problem is most acute with the elderly, since many are already in weakened states and can least afford such wasting.

Surgeons are now thinking twice about lengthy immobilization protocols. Studies of hip replacement patients have shown that early weight-bearing significantly reduces mortality rate, a serious problem in older individuals. In more recent studies, physicians have found that walking earlier with femur fractures had no higher level of complications that those who stayed off the leg for six weeks.

In a 2024 study involving 480 fractured ankle cases across 23 U.K. centers, half of the patients were instructed to walk after two weeks, the other half after six weeks. The incidence of complications was equal between the two groups; moreover, the early weight-bearing group reported better ankle function both at six weeks and at four months post-surgery.

Of course, early weight-bearing doesn't mean normal activity, but if healing can be accomplished in significantly less time, early walking will bring better bone health with less inconvenience. **Steve Downs**
