Science Tidbits

"So you have a.childhood memory, but is it real?"

When you think back on your childhood, do you have any fond memories of your earliest years? Perhaps some significant family event when you were two or three? Chances are, such memories may not have happened the way you remember them, or maybe not even at all.



My family moved into a new house and neighborhood the year I entered first grade. My childhood memories before that time, the first five years or so of my life, are sporadic, and the strongest ones include sitting in the basement on a stuffed chair on Saturday morning watching Mighty Mouse cartoons, filling a wagon with maturing cotton pods from cottonwood trees, and stepping on a rusty nail in a neighbor's sandbox, which led to a tetanus shot. I am sure these memories occurred during the last year before we moved, when I was a five-year-old. They are probably real memories, because the first well retained long-term memories are initiated, on the average, patchy footage appears at about age three-and-a-half. Indeed, the earlier years for me are a blur.

But yet children are capable of forming memories as early as their second year, though they are not long-lasting. Some people insist that they remember events earlier than this, but researchers believe these memories are fabricated. How can that be? Most likely they have seen an old family photograph or home movie or were told a story by a sibling from which their mind has created a false memory. I can attest to this. One of my memories (or at least what I thought was one) was an image of my maternal grandfather standing at one end of their house in Duluth. But this was impossible, because he passed away when I was just a baby. Then I found a picture of him that was an exact replica of the memory my brain had conjured up.

A fascinating study was done with young children who were questioned about their memory of a particular family event during their second year of life. Once they could articulate a memory that was confirmed by a parent, the investigators returned on a yearly basis to question the children about that one event. The children progressively remembered fewer and fewer details of the event the older they got until by age seven most of them had no recollection at all of the event. This phenomenon has been termed "childhood amnesia."

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There are a couple ideas for these results. One is that to form enduring memories one has to have a well-developed language. Since the child's language at that early age is not yet very sophisticated, memory formation is immature and temporary. Another important fact is that throughout child-hood the brain is undergoing very active development. As a result, the flurry of new cell formation (babies form 700 new neural connections per second) disrupts the connections needed to store information long-term.

This all being said, to have the greatest chance of remembering early memories, the memories should have strong emotional impact. A survey of 2,000 adults revealed the 50 most common childhood memories. The top three? From first place to third: place family Christmas dinner, a family outing at the beach, and visiting grandparents. -Steve Downs
